

TWIN OAKS VALLEY WATER TREATMENT PLANT UPDATE

Truck traffic on Twin Oaks Valley Road will ramp up for a few weeks starting this week — a sign that construction of the water treatment plant is truly winding down. The buildings are constructed and the majority of equipment is installed. The additional trucks on the road will be delivering gravel and asphalt for paving the access roads connecting the various buildings and facilities within the plant.

Another sign that the plant is nearly done: Work is focused on operating and testing the water treatment processes that have been installed in recent months. Water is flowing through the treatment plant, and each step in the process is being scrutinized to ensure that the new plant meets very high quality and efficiency standards.

More good news — the plant remains on schedule to begin producing very high quality drinking water by tax day, April 15. There may be some project wrap-up activities after April, but these should not present any disturbances to the community.
